JANUARY 2023 LWML MISSION GRANT



Showing God's Love and Making a Difference

Showing God's Love in the International District, Albuquerque, New Mexico — God Cares About You Mission — \$98,000

Therefore I command you, 'You shall open wide your hand to your brother, to the needy and to the poor, in your land' (Deuteronomy 15:11).

The International District is in southeast Albuquerque, New Mexico and is home to an ethnically diverse and disadvantaged people. The population is multicultural representing more than ten nations. Forty percent live below the poverty level. Crime, drug and alcohol abuse, homelessness, prostitution, teen pregnancy, poor living conditions, low education levels, low paying jobs, and health issues put the well-being of adults and children at risk.

In 2009, a mission outreach was initiated in Albuquerque. The pastor and members of Christ Lutheran Church had a passion to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to help people. They reached out to show God's love in the International District and started God Cares About You, a mission to help meet the physical and spiritual needs of those in the community. By sharing Christ's love, they are transforming lives now and for eternity.

Mission volunteers embrace and work through cultural differences knowing that God is using them to further His kingdom and help people in their daily life. As they serve, they build relationships and meet people where they are. God Cares About You uses various programs to reach people in the International District. Some of the programs include children's ministry, tutoring, helping with homework, Bible lessons, adult Bible study, supplying meals, fellowship, providing groceries and clothing, teaching life skills, supporting a Back to Work Program, and guidance to connect with community resources. Volunteers help them learn how God cares about them and that God is real as they grow in faith and learn about His promises.

God Cares About You is currently open three days a week. This grant will provide funds to hire a services coordinator and a kitchen manager. With the increase in staff, services can be offered six days a week with extended hours. The needs of the community are great and the funds from this grant will help improve the lives of people physically and spiritually. It is estimated that 2,000 people are touched by God Cares About You each month.

Sunday School Lesson Summaries

UNIT 5

God Leads His Nation:

Jan 08, Lesson 1:

The lesson this week is "The Idle Idol." Atop Mount Sinai, Moses receives the Law from God. Meanwhile, the Israelites grow impatient and convince Aaron to create a golden idol. When God sends Moses down from the mountain, Moses sees the people's wanton worship and smashes the stone tables. The people are punished for their idolatry. Moses returns to Sinai to plead God's mercy for the people.

Jan 15, Lesson 2:

Today, we will study "A Tent for God." Moses the process of building a portable house (called a tabernacle) for the Lord by gathering from the Israelites. God provides detailed instruction for the creation of the ark of the covenant as well as the fixtures of the tabernacle. When the tabernacle is finally assembled, the glory of the Lord descends on the tabernacle in

the form of a cloud. As long as the presence remains, the people remain in that place.

Jan 22, Lesson 3:

In today's lesson. "The Fall-Short Report." Students will learn how Moses chooses one man from each of the twelve tribes and sends them to spy on the land God has promised. The spies report a land of great plenty but occupied by mighty, fearsome people. Despite Caleb and Joshua's pleas to seize the land promised to them, the people rebel. Moses pleads for mercy, and God promises to care for His people. At the same time, He condemns the Israelites to forty years of wandering in the wilderness. Of all the adults, only Joshua and Caleb will live to enter the Promised Land.

Jan 29, Lesson 4:

In today's lesson, "The Unlikely Ally," the Israelites prepare to enter the Promised Land. Joshua Sends two spies to explore Jericho, a prostitute, first hides the spies from the authorities, and later she helps them escape out her window in the city wall. Because of her faithfulness, the spies promise to spare Rahab and her family when the Israelites come to occupy the city.

Some History from The Past:

1932:

By 1932 the State Walther League convention was hosted with 500 in attendance. Due to strong beliefs about Christian education Pastor Streufert, supported by Henry Haas and other leaders encouraged Immanuel to start a Christian Day School – Plans came together and a Christian Day School was implemented in 1933. It was started in the basement of the church with 25 student in the 8 grades with one teacher. Pastor Streufert would don his "funny little cap" and drive an old school bus 50 miles everyday to pick up students while the teacher drove the pastor's car in another direction to pick up others. A car pool brought some from the Newburg area. With in 3 years enrollment increased to 66.

1916:

The original English version of the 1916 Constitution follow, it was also written in German.
