Building Relationships While Spreading the Gospel in Belize

Mercy House Belize Lutheran Campus Seine Bight, Belize — \$100,000

Seine Bight, a coastal village in southern Belize with a population of over 1,200 people, struggles with poverty, a high unemployment rate, young single motherhood, and a literacy rate of only 79 percent. The country of Belize, along with this village, hosts a variety of religious influences, many of which are misunderstood and combined by the people. Christ Lutheran Church, located in Seine Bight, is the first Lutheran church in Belize, and was founded in 2019 by The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) and Belize Mission Society.

Belize Mission Society (BMS), a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS, began in 2003 with seven volunteers on a short-term mission trip providing Vacation Bible School (VBS) to 180 children. The mission has expanded over the years, with construction projects, dental and medical clinics, adult and youth Bible studies, sports programs, an education tutor program, scholarship programs, and an elementary school lunch program.

In 2009, it was noted that many of the students at the village's school did not have food for lunch. BMS worked with a local resident to begin feeding 30 students in her home, resulting in a program called "Food for Thought". Teachers noticed an improvement in students' test scores and increased attention in class. As BMS contributions increased, an empty classroom was turned into a kitchen and lunchroom for 60–65 students, 20 percent of the school's enrollment. A larger space is needed to provide food to more children.

Currently, the BMS dental clinic is in the multi-purpose building in the village. The multi-purpose building also holds mission team supplies, such as VBS supplies, dental and physical therapy equipment, and construction equipment. The contract with the village to use the multi-purpose building expires in 2024 and the village does not wish to renew it.

This mission grant will allow the building of a Mercy House on property located next to Christ Lutheran Church and the village school. It will be run by BMS in cooperation with Christ Lutheran Church. The Belize Lutheran Campus will be a focal point for tutoring children, VBS activities, adult Bible studies, medical and dental services, serving meals to students, sharing the Gospel of Jesus, and supporting short-term mission team activities.

And though a man might prevail against one who is alone, two will withstand him – a threefold cord is not quickly broken (Ecclesiastes 4:12). By building Mercy House next to the church, relationship building of the BMS with local residents will provide a tangible connection to Christ Lutheran Church. By caring for the physical needs of the people of Seine Bight, missionaries will be able to share the saving relationship with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Sunday School Lesson Summaries UNIT 4 God Calls A Nation

November 6, Lesson 9:

As we gather today, we will study. "A Family Reunites," as God helps Joseph forgive, Joseph's siblings' journey to Egypt hoping to find food for their family. Failing to recognize Joseph, the brothers head home with sustenance and supplies. Heeding Joseph's early warning, the brothers bring Benjamin when returning to Egypt for food. After testing and trying his brothers, Joseph finally reveals himself to his astonished siblings. Joseph relocates all of Jacob's family to

November 13,

Lesson 10:

Egypt, promising to care for them.

"A Basket of Hope" is today's lesson in which participants explore the birth of Moses. Three hundred years after the death of Joseph. Egypt's new pharaoh despises the Hebrews. Pharaoh demands greater work output from the Hebrew slaves while seeking to reduce their population through infanticide. Moses' mother manages to hide baby Moses until he is three months old, when she finally sets him afloat in a basket. Discovered by Pharaoh's daughter, Moses enters a life of privilege.

November 20,

Lesson 11:

Today we will study "Signs of the True God," as student learn more about Moses and the plagues. God guides Moses to release His People from their slavery in Egypt, but Pharaoh proves less than cooperative. A series of plagues—foretold Moses and sent by God--- brings destruction and pain upon the Egyptians but only serves to harden Pharaoh's heart against Moses and the Israelites.

November 27,

Lesson 12:

"The Passover Promise" is this week's lesson about God's establishment of the Passover. God, through Moses, threatens one final plague--- worse than any previously experienced. Following God's instructions, the Israelites make careful preparations for the Passover, making their doorposts with the blood of a lamb prepared for the feast. The final plague takes place at midnight as all the firstborn throughout Egypt die. Egyptians hand over their valuables hastening the Israelites away.

Some History from the past:

As told by Dottye Wolf in 2016:

2016- Immanuel Lutheran Church celebrate its 100-year anniversary – It was seen as a reminder of the unwavering Word of God that has gotten most of its members and their extended families through the trials of life.

It's not the stuffy dates and fading photos are not what marks a 100-year celebration. It's the memories and passed-down stories of those still living.

The only Lutheran church in the area in the 1800's was Pease Lutheran, south of Rolla. At that time, there was a large German population, according to Dottye Haas Wolf and her brother Edward Haas, whose parents were charter members of Immanuel Lutheran Church. She and her siblings were all baptized and confirmed in the church and they attended Lutheran school.

It was their great-grandfather that started Pease Lutheran church – But the services were delivered only in the German language. It Was Dottye and Ed's mother, along with other Rolla residents, that were behind the efforts to start a church in Rolla, that delivered services in the English language. She didn't speak German, says Dottye. She says they knew an English language service was a key to getting the growth, Immanuel Lutheran Church was born. It was built at 12th. And Spring Street in Rolla. Those first services were conducted by Rev. Ottoman Krueger.

The first service must have been a bit like attending a United Nations Meeting. The service was still in German, but this time a German to English language interpreter was used. "It was a different time **Totally**, than we can ever imagine", says Dottye.

Dottye has many good memories of followship at Immanuel Lutheran. She loved her years of singing in the church choir. Another memory is what she calls," Missouri Festival". We believe in the inspired "Word of God". We believe that our sins are forgiven by Jesus's death and the Gospels messages. We go strictly by the Bible of the Old and New Testaments. Dottye says there is some German cultures within the church. "Our order of service that we use at Immanuel is old", probably from transcribed from German. Some of the orders of worship are still used, since I was a child."

What does Immanuel Church have in store for the citizens of Rolla within the next 100 years? Dottye says, "To continue to be a mission – that's our purpose – To bring as many souls to Christ as we can
